people he's known for only a short amount of time.

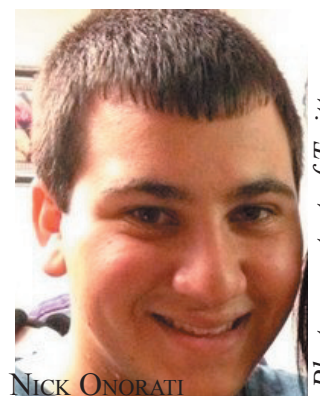
During his time at NBTHS, Nick really took his time to get involved. He played soccer Freshman year and has been an active member of Key Club all four years.

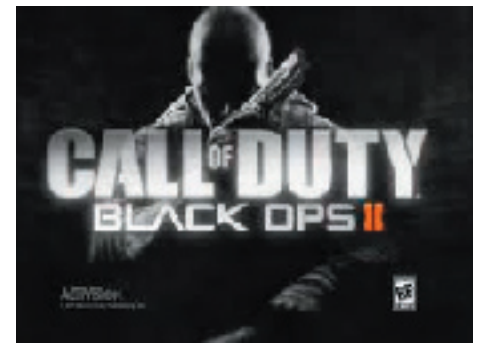

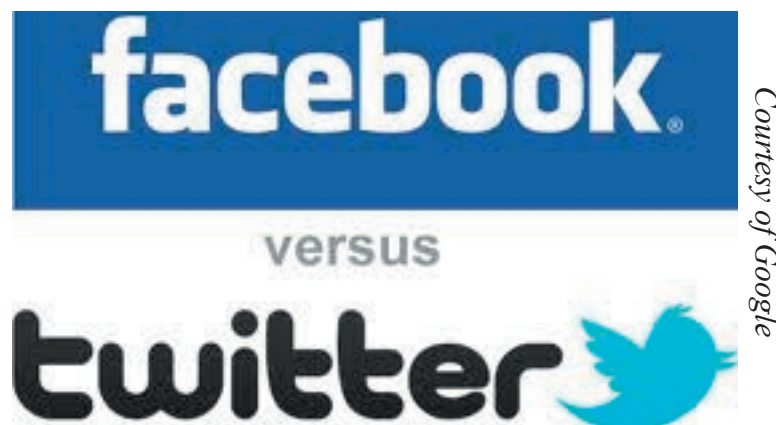
Looks can also be considered superficial and if one lets their talent be defined only by looks, their fame will most likely be short-lived.

With late night studying and early morning alarm clocks, it's hard to get in the recommended amount of sleep is 8 ½ to 10 hours.

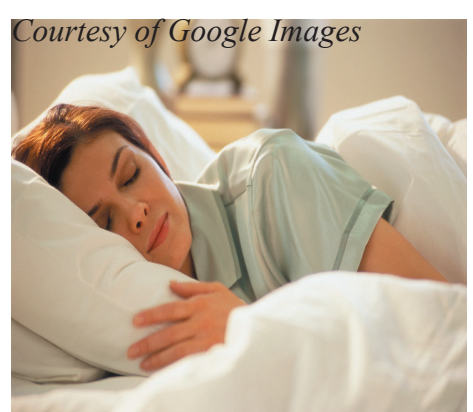
"Almost all teen-agers, as they reach puberty, become walking zombies because they are getting far too little sleep," says Cornell University psychologist James B. Maas.

Google Inc. has introduced a brand new device. The device is a pair of glasses, but not just any glasses. These glasses could allow you to view the weather, check the news on your favorite sports teams or even just ask for simple directions to the nearest restaurant. These glasses are known as Project Glass.

Project Glass is a "research and development" program in which Google Inc. is developing an "augmented reality head mounted display", better known as a HMD. The device will have information that is fed to the user through a smartphone-like format by looking into a little glass rectangle at the right side of the device. The user will also be able to use the Internet through voice commands.

The size and appearance of the device is only a aluminum strip with 2 nose pads supporting the structure as it integrates with a user's own pair of glasses or with the devices own lenses, with a heads up display or a 'HUD' showing the information that the user needs.

Prototypes of the device have already been in testing by multiple
